1. THE HILL HOUSE

The Hill House, considered to be Mackintosh's domestic masterpiece, was originally designed for the publisher Walter Blackie. It is now in the care of the National Trust for Scotland. The unique building, interiors and collection were designed by Mackintosh and Margaret Macdonald Mackintosh in the 'Glasgow style'.



2. MACKINTOSH AT THE WILLOW

Mackintosh at the Willow underwent an impressive four-year restoration process, re-opening in 2018. The original Willow Tea Rooms Building was initially opened by Miss Cranston and designed by Mackintosh in 1903. Visitors can view the impressive interiors and enjoy an immersive dining experience in the Salon de Luxe.

The only church in the world designed by Mackintosh, where space and light are used to dramatic effect. Interior highlights include the magnificent stained glass and relief carving on wood and stonework. Events are regularly held in the church, visit their website to find out more.

The Mackintosh and Glasgow Style gallery is divided into six stories. It is the largest display in the city of the Glasgow Style's wide range of media and technique. The collection includes tearoom interiors by Mackintosh and gesso panels by Margaret Macdonald. As well as glass, enamels, metalwork, ceramics and furniture by their contemporaries.

The Glasgow School of Art's Window on Heritage and Reid Galleries are open to the public. They also have an Archives and Collections centre, based at The Whisky Bond (G), which holds works by Mackintosh and his contemporaries. Visit the archives website to find out how you can visit (pre-booking required). Work on rebuilding the Mackintosh Building continues. Hoardings erected detail the history of the building and project updates.

The fully restored Oak Room is on permanent display at the heart of V&A Dundee's Scottish Design Galleries allowing visitors to become fully immersed in the design world of Mackintosh. The Oak Room was designed by Mackintosh in 1907 for Miss Cranston's Ingram Street tearooms.

Set within the grounds of Glasgow's Bellahouston Park, the house was completed in 1996 and inspired by Mackintosh's portfolio of drawings of 1901. A permanent exhibition of decorative furnished rooms is on display. The venue combines art gallery and exhibition spaces and multipurpose artists' studios.

Charles Rennie Mackintosh, 1868–1928

ARCHITECT ▪ ARTIST ▪ ICON

Charles Rennie Mackintosh was born one of 11 children in the Townhead area of Glasgow, near Glasgow Cathedral. He became one of the most celebrated architects of his generation.

Mackintosh met Margaret Macdonald, his future wife, at Glasgow School of Art. Much of what you will see on your visits to the Mackintosh attractions involves their artistic collaboration. You will see his masterful handling of light and space, his skilful use of colour and his much celebrated treatment of the room as a complete "work of art". Many of his pieces of furniture have become design icons worldwide.

Mackintosh took inspiration from Scottish traditions and blended them with the flourish of Art Nouveau and the simplicity of Japanese forms. His work can now be seen alongside those in the group known as "The Four" and the other artists and designers who collectively created the Glasgow Style.
