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Speakers



Stewart Mercer is the Director of the Scottish School of Primary Care and Professor of Primary Care Research in the University of Glasgow. He is national lead for research into the problems of multi-morbidity in primary care in Scotland.



Catherine Calderwood is the Chief Medical Officer for Scotland, appointed in March 2015. She continues to practice as an obstetrician and gynaecologist. Her research interests include thromboembolic disease in pregnancy and she is an investigator on the AFFIRM study



John Gilles is Deputy Director of SSPC and an Honorary Professor of General Practice at the University of Edinburgh. He is co-director of the Edinburgh Compassion Initiative within the Global Health Academy. He currently chairs the strategy group for SPIRE (Scottish Primary Care Information Resource) and a joint Scottish Government/ Board for Academic Medicine group on increasing undergraduate exposure to primary care.



Bruce Guthrie is a general practitioner and mixed methods health services researcher with an interest in quality and safety of care, particularly in relation to prescribing, multimorbidity and organisation of care. He is Professor of Primary Care Medicine at University of Dundee and GP in Wallsgreen Medical Practice in Cardenden in Fife.



Tara Sampalli is the Assistant Director for Research in Primary Healthcare, at the Nova Scotia Health Authority and Assistant Professor of Medical Informatics at Dalhousie University. Holding a Ph.D. degree in Health Informatics, Tara effectively blends research with practice bringing the novel concept of "embedded research" into healthcare.



Renee Lyons is an emeritus health systems researcher and social scientist from Dalhousie University and University of Toronto, Canada. She held two research chairs focusing on health systems reform in chronic and complex disease. She is currently working on a Scotland-New Scotland Research Alliance on Integrated Primary care.
